Settle In

NRC-RIM is a partner with Settle In, an initiative launched in September 2021 by CORE, which engages newly arrived Afghans and Ukrainians resettling in the U.S. in an interactive format. This free, publicly available resource connects new arrivals to vital information on early resettlement services, employment, housing, education, and healthcare.
